<u>Scope</u>: Trichiasis is the inward turning/growing of the eyelashes. The eyelashes rub against the corneal surface and conjunctiva causing irritation and infection. When this persists, the eyelashes are removed by forceps or by surgery (electrolysis, cryosurgery, ablation, etc)

## **Clinical Indications:**

- Correction of trichiasis is indicated when inward growing eyelashes cause ocular surface irritation, light sensitivity, and infection.
- Common conditions that cause of trichiasis:
  - Chronic blepharitis
  - o Ocular trauma
  - o Epiblepharon/congenital
  - Herpes zoster
  - o Stevens-Johnson syndrome and cicatricial pemphigoid
  - Trachoma
